From the pastor's desk

Psalm 137:1-3
By the rivers of Babylon—
there we sat down and there we wept
when we remembered Zion.
On the willows there
we hung up our harps.
For there our captors
asked us for songs,
and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying,
"Sing us one of the songs of Zion!"



Dear Siblings in Christ,

While I'm sure I had heard Psalm 137 read in church before high school, I became better acquainted with the words through Don Mclean's "Babylon." A simple song found on the same album that introduced the world to "American Pie." This haunting melody sung in a round has stuck with me for years. I was reintroduced to these striking words when listening to "On the Willows" from the Broadway musical Godspell. Both experiences with these words set to music have solidified this Psalm's place in my understanding of faith. This Psalm captures the lament of the Babylonian Exile in the starkest of terms, ending with a very violent and disturbing image that does not refrain from acknowledging deep anger and frustration.

2021 was not the reset to "normal" that many of us may have wanted or expected. This experience of an elongated pandemic was further marred with personal tragedies and moments of loss. Perhaps you two have wanted to hang up the harp and weep from time to time throughout the year.

What strikes me most about this Psalm is the very fact that it remains a song. While unable to "sing a song of Zion" in the moment of Exile, the people of Israel were able to continue in faith and hope long enough that this song could one day come to their lips and be written into our story of faith. Yes, it's a song of sadness, frustration, and anger. But it's this lament song also surrounded by Psalms of praise, joyous tunes exalting God for the beauty of creation, and the works of love and mercy God performs.

Now we have been able to sing amid this time. There have been wonderful moments of worship and community throughout this year, and I look forward to a time when our lament of the pandemic can also be sung in the past tense like Psalm 137 with the Exile. In January during the time of Epiphany and our annual meeting, we have great opportunities to look for the manifested presence of God in our midst, and seek the guiding light of Christ in our community. Let's keep the song going.



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Anti-racist activity-January 2022

Isaiah 35:8

A highway shall be there,
and it shall be called the Holy Way;
the unclean shall not travel on it,
but it shall be for God's people;
no traveler, not even fools, shall go astray.



Throughout the past month, we have heard the cry of the prophets to make way for the Lord. As I reflected on "The Way" of Christ, I remembered when I had heard about Isaiah and I-35. The highway that runs through the heart of the Twin Cities has a strange place for some who see it as divinely placed. This verse from Isaiah 35 (I-35 get it?) that references a "Holy Way" is the backbone for this odd subset of prophecy seekers. Unfortunately, the history of this highway is similar to many in our country's roadways as planned, developed, and built. Learning this often untold history demonstrates how historically Black communities were neglected or ignored in public planning. If we are honestly working to prepare a Just Highway for the Lord, learning these stories help us all understand what happened and what could to done to repair the damages. 


February-Winter Garden by Kristin Hannah

At once an epic love story set in World War II Russia and an intimate portrait of contemporary mothers and daughters poised at the crossroads of their lives, it explores the heartbreak of war, the cost of survival and the ultimate triumph of the human spirit. It is a novel that will haunt the reader long after the last page is turned.

March-I Am Malala: The Girl Who Stood Up for Education and was Shot by the Taliban by Christina Lamb and Malala Yousafzai

"I come from a country that was created at midnight. When I almost died it was just after midday."

When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, one girl spoke out. Malala Yousafzai refused to be silenced and fought for her right to an education.

On Tuesday, October 9, 2012, when she was fifteen, she almost paid the ultimate price. She was shot in the head at point-blank range while riding the bus home from school, and few expected

her to survive.

Instead, Malala's miraculous recovery has taken her on an extraordinary journey from a remote valley in northern Pakistan to the halls of the United Nations in New York. At sixteen, she became a global symbol of peaceful protest and the youngest nominee ever for the Nobel Peace Prize.

I AM MALALA is the remarkable tale of a family uprooted by global terrorism, of the fight for girls' education, of a father who, himself a school owner, championed and encouraged his daughter to write and attend school, and of brave parents who have a fierce love for their daughter in a society that prizes sons. I AM MALALA will make you believe in the power of one person's voice to inspire change in the world.

No report given.


Communications:
